Dear Parents and Caregivers,





It was on Tuesday at 4:15 pm and I encountered the following activities on our tour: 12 students involved in Chess club, 10 students playing Dungeons and Dragons, 18 students attending extra Geography tutorials with Mr. Wallace and Ms. Dignan, 20 students rehearsing with Mrs. Karney for the Radio Announcing section of the Sydney Eisteddfod, 10 students involved in the Junior Dance Company with Ms. Knight, the cast of nineteen students in the Junior Drama Production rehearsing with Mr. Montgomery, two girls basketball teams having their practice, eight students working on their Art with Ms. Bambach and finally when I walked into the Music Terrace there was the entire String Orchestra rehearsing for their debut performance that evening. All in all approximately 120 students engaged and enjoying activities after school and I have not included those playing sport offcampus. As you can imagine, the parents were blown away by all the activity and to be quite honest, so was I.

The Sport and Academy program is a rich and varied one that allows students to find enrichment and extension within areas of their passion. As the year is moving increasingly closer to HSC, Year 12 Music students have been taking advantage of every opportunity to develop and refine their performance and submitted works. Last week, Music 2 students spent some time with a string quartet who workshopped their Core Compositions and gave them valuable feedback on how to improve from a player's perspective. Hearing live musicians performing your music creations is a unique and valued privilege indeed, and one that these student's works will benefit from enormously.

On Wednesday this week, Music Extension students visited the Sydney Conservatorium to participate in a Vocal Workshop with 1st and 2nd year university students. Following a private tour of the Con and all its facilities, students saw first-hand what it was like to be a student studying for the Bachelor of Performance qualification as they were invited to participate in the class and provide constructive feedback to performers who were preparing for recitals. As their HSC examinations draw closer and they are deliberating on what the future holds, it's a unique opportunity to stand in the shoes of a university student and discover first-hand what is in store beyond high school. Well done to all these music students for embracing the challenges laid before them and seeking out every opportunity for growth and development.

Rehearsals for the Senior Drama production "The 'Bassett" are well underway as can be seen from the report by Gabriella Steinberg, Karl Page, and Coco Veksner-Shaw (Year 10):

"We've been rehearsing for 'Bassett' by James Graham since late February and have made brilliant progress so far. The rehearsals are most certainly a commitment worth making. At this point, we're nearly offscript for the whole play and are working on bringing the text to life and properly embodying our characters. We have developed a fun and exciting rehearsal atmosphere, becoming more and more enjoyable as the cast get to know each other more. There are subtle and interesting connections and dynamics between certain characters that are imperative in the process of creating an engaging performance of the play.

Throughout the rehearsals, we've all found ourselves interacting with other students who we wouldn't usually talk with and had plenty of fun building the scenes together. We're truly pushing our acting abilities with the complexity of realist style acting, playing complex three dimensional characters.

We have been focusing on creating a realistic classroom dynamic, with each line we deliver occurring directly after the last, achieving a genuine portrayal of a conversation between students, instead of merely actors on stage. Overall the entire cast is enjoying the process of putting the play together, and we are excited to see what future rehearsals hold."



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This week our Elective Year 11 and 12 Drama students attended a production of 'The Removalists' written by David Williamson at New Theatre. The excursion supported their understanding of the play, which they will study as part of their HSC Course. 
MIDDLE SCHOOL DRAMA COMPANY

BODY IMAGE Typs FOR PARENTS

Children are very sensitive to messages about body image and appearance from their parents. Often you may not even be aware of the messages your child is hearing from you. Parents can have a very positive impact on the way a child feels about the way they look and their self esteem. Helping your child develop a healthy body image is important as it can also strengthen their relationship with eating and exercise and reduce the risk of developing disordered eating and eating disorders.

Here are some tips on ways you can be a good body image role model for your child:

Reflect on your own relationship with your body. This may not be easy but being aware of your attitude towards your own body will help you be conscious of the messages you send to your kids. Try to avoid looking in the mirror and making negative comments about the way you look. If your child sees that you feel comfortable and happy with your body, this can help them feel comfortable in their own skin.

Avoid talking about diets. Dieting is the biggest risk factor for an eating disorder. Try to avoid talking about diets, your "naughty" eating habits, or your weight and size. This can give kids the impression that weight and size are highly valued by you and they might feel pressure to look a certain way or be a certain size. Celebrate diversity and emphasise how loved and valued your child is no matter what their weight, shape or size.

Talk to your child about the way they feel about the way they look. Encourage your child to talk with you about their feelings. Create space to talk about things on a daily basis including what is happening with their friends. If your child feels safe to talk to you, then they are likely to share feelings about their bodies with you.

Help your child stay body confident when using social media. Talk to your child about the realities of digital manipulation and that what they see in the media and online is not always real. Encourage them to reflect on how their social media experiences make them feel and if it's not positive then they need to change it up. Despite best parenting efforts serious body image issues and eating disorders do develop. It's important to recognise the warning signs of body dissatisfaction and low self esteem as early as possible. There are certain cues you can pick up on in your child once you know what to look for.

Here are some warning signs to keep an eye on in your child:

- Withdrawal from social events and activities that they used to enjoy
- A focus on diets, calories, health and particular foods. They
 might talk about wanting to be healthier or fitter and become
 obsessive about checking the nutritional content of what they
 are eating.
- They might become irritable or anxious around dinner time. They may refuse to eat certain foods or whole food groups.
- Complaints about the way they look, e.g. "I'm ugly" or "I'm fat", or negative comments about their abilities, e.g. "I'm hopeless"
- Frequent self scrutiny such as weighing themselves or excessively looking at their reflection.
- Change in clothing style such as wearing baggy or oversized clothing

If you notice any of these signs in your child it is important to seek help as early as possible. You know your child best, so trust your instincts. If you are finding it hard to be accepting of your own body, remember it's never too late to seek help.
