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Dear Parents and Caregivers,

The first full week of the new academic year went smoothly, as everyone slotted seamlessly into the term's academic, sporting and cultural activities. Any institution is only as good as those who run it, and I was grateful this past week to see the teachers, coaches and support staff back at full tilt, all for the benefit of the students.

The start of a school year is inevitably a mix of emotions. There are those students who can't wait to return – to see their friends and teachers, take part in the many activities on offer, and challenge themselves to explore new, exciting adventures. Then again, there are a number for whom the start of a new year brings a degree of trepidation. The staff and I are only too aware of this and we keep a careful eye on all the students, in order to pick up any who are struggling or looking anxious.

One thing which the pandemic reminds us is that we all respond differently to stress, insecurities, and change. As we grow older, we learn how to deal with such challenges, but for the students, who are still young and inexperienced in understanding their feelings, this is still a time of emotional development. As such, we try all we can to be aware of those who are struggling and to come alongside them, especially in these first few weeks of the term.

For some, the challenge might be in meeting new classmates, or getting used to a new venue, or new teachers. Others might find taking part in cultural and sporting events difficult, especially if they haven't tried them before. Then again, there are those for whom a step up in academic standard proves really hard to navigate. In all such cases, we hope to build relationships with the students that encourage them to ask for help when needed.

If there is one element which has stood out for Reddam House Primary School over recent years, it is the caring relationships which characterise the people who arrive here each day. Whether in the friendships and kind acts shown by the students to each other, or the empathy between teachers and students, or the animated buzz so evident among the teachers – sincere relationships form the backbone of our school.





If your child is feeling anxious in any way, please do encourage him or her to reach out to a teacher or coach. Part of growing up entails acknowledging one's feelings and then looking for ways in which to cope when such emotions threaten to derail us. The staff and I remain committed to helping each child grow in confidence during their time in the Primary School, and we hope that they know that we are here to walk alongside them, no matter the challenge.

It was certainly a busy and exciting week for the Year 4 to 6 students, who started their year off in the best possible way – **camping**! As the following three reports indicate, a good time was had by all and hopefully memories were made which will last a lifetime. We hope too that this was a time of bonding as year groups, and that it also helped to integrate all new students into our special Reddam House family.

The **Year 4** students had another outstanding week, the highlight of which was the Year 4 Camp! Students were beyond excited Tuesday morning, as they boarded the bus, preparing for an adventure in the **Blue Mountains**.

KINDERGARTEN

What an amazing first full week in Kindergarten! The teachers were overwhelmed with the enthusiasm about homework and the smiling faces greeting them each morning. Thank you to the parents for providing support with these activities at home.

This week we focused on the letters 'i' and 't'. The Kindergarten students were kept very busy exploring words that contain these two special letters. We created igloos and tigers with different materials and also practised these two letters in our Handwriting Books.

During our Maths sessions, we focused on whole numbers to '5'. The students worked hard to form each number correctly using their whiteboards and rainbow writing. We had so much fun playing many Maths games involving matching the numbers to the quantity and ordering smallest to largest.

Throughout our integrated topis 'Marvellous Me' the students explored how we are different and how we are the same. We had so much fun creating our very own self-portraits using oil pastels and then comparing our portraits to pictures of ourselves.

The Kindergarten teachers are so proud of the hard work each student is putting into their learning. What a great start to the year!



This week in Year 1 the children enjoyed learning about light and its interaction with our power of sight. The children explored light sources and delighted in using torches to create shadow and observed how the manipulation of the light changes the shadow cast. It was impressive to see how the students can identify many light sources and explain how they work. Great enthusiasm was displayed for our interactive Science lessons and we just can't wait for more!

Within History and Geography, we are continuing our topic of 'Identifying Us' to examine families of the past and present. It was exciting to observe the students beginning to use the appropriate terminology to communicate an understanding of the distinction between the past, present and future. Their historical skills are already being displayed through the use of collaborative learning strategies, as they confidently share their ideas and thoughts with others.

In Maths, we investigated number sequences and focussed on place value. It is pleasing to see the children understand that whilst a digit can be the same, its value depends on where it is in the number.

Our Author Study of Anthony Browne has led us to be able to develop our inference skills and talk around illustrations. The imagery in his texts is always impressive and significant and the children are gaining such a rich experience through being immersed in the visual as well as the literal.



After our first full week of Year 2, our students are now feeling organised and have been introduced to most of the routines that they will be familiar with for the remainder of the year. They are excited and ready to learn!

In Mathematics, we revised and expanded upon our knowledge of addition. We also enjoyed learning about 'friendly numbers' which is a new mental strategy to help us with addition and subtraction.

In English, we were introduced to the storybook 'Lost!' by Stephanie Owen Reeder which relates well to our history topic of the past. The children will be able to compare and contrast the way life is now with the ways in which children lived 150 years ago. This will also lead us into our Science and Technology unit of Communication. The ways we communicate in 2021 are very different to how we communicated in the past!



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We are on target for a GREAT year!

In Year 3 we are feeling more comfortable in the classroom, those beginning of the term butterflies have settled and been replaced with a positive sense of the year ahead. It's going to stretch us sometimes, but we will do our best. We are mostly remembering to take out our diaries first thing in the morning and write down our homework. We are learning the rules of the classroom and getting to know our teachers and classmates. Slowly but surely this new routine is going to feel like it was always this way.

YEAR 5 ENGLISH

After recuperating from the thrill of camp week in Year 5, students began to explore the topic of persuasive writing, focusing on specific aspects of the structure. Students discussed previous attempts at persuasive writing and recalled the features that they felt were essential to a successful persuasive piece of writing. Afterwards, students worked together with their class and teacher to collectively produce an introductory paragraph for a persuasive essay on whether or not children should have to wear bike helmets when riding. Below is a sample of a class's work from this activity.

Imagine this you are riding with a helmet on, every bump sends the helmet over your eyes, you can feel it scratching your scalp distracting you, almost causing you to crash. Is this really a lifesaving device? This is why I strongly believe that kids should not be required to wear helmets. Firstly, buying a helmet can be very expensive. Secondly, they can obscure your vision whilst riding making it even more unsafe. Lastly, they are extremely irritating to wear. Overall, I strongly believe that helmets do more harm than good.

YEAR 5 AND 6 MATHEMATICS

Although the first three days of the week consisted of camp, we did manage to use the other two days to complete some much-anticipated mathematics.

The focus for Year 5 was on revising our multiplication facts and reinforcing mathematical concepts and language. We also focused on writing and saying big numbers.

In Year 6 we followed the same start as the Year 5 group, but we added some exponents into the mix when representing big numbers. We also began looking at some strategies that we can use when attempting to complete problem solving questions in mathematics.

A reminder that mathematics tutorials are available after school to our students and these will commence in Week 3.






YEAR 5 AND 6 SCIENCE

After the excitement of camp, the pupils returned to the Science classroom. This week, pupils were introduced to their topics and covered safety in the lab. All pupils have identified potential hazards in the lab and how to avoid.

This term year 6 will focus on the fascinating world of micro- organisms, looking at how microorganisms act and their characteristics. Whilst year 5 this term are delving into the living world and the adaptation/ survival methods of plants and animals. Pupils are going to be building on their knowledge weekly to fully understand how these parts of the world operate and how they relate to the pupils ' everyday lives.



YEAR 6 ENGLISH

After the excitement of camp, Year Six returned to the English classroom. We began exploring the new unit of work on 'Australian Identity' that we will complete this term. Students in lessons discussed the concept of a national identity. We examined Australia's indigenous, colonial and multicultural heritage before reflecting on our own opinions of what it means to be 'Australian' in the 21st Century.
