Sport is one of those activities which provides us with constant feedback of how we are performing - train hard, test yourself, and hopefully you receive positive feedback regarding the benefits of your training. This applies to academic work too. During the course of a typical week, students constantly receive feedback. Whether it is in their own satisfaction of a goal being achieved for a cycle test, or in the feedback they receive from their teachers and parents, regular feedback is a necessity on the path of learning.

Well-known business author, Ken Blanchard, reminds us that "Feedback is the breakfast of champions." Regular feedback allows us to measure ourselves against our expectations for a particular task. Sadly, however, it also sometimes causes us to measure ourselves against the achievements of others. It is human nature to be competitive and this is no different in a school environment, where the students are very aware of their peers' achievements, whether in the classroom, or in their cultural and sporting activities.

However, one of the most valuable lessons we as adults should constantly be reminding the students, hard though this is at times, is that any comparisons should only be against their own previous achievements. We should encourage them to ask themselves how much they knew six months ago, or how far they have come in their sports skills compared to a time in the past, or how they have mastered another piece of music, which they could never have done previously. The more they learn how to measure themselves against themselves - and not against others - the more satisfied they will ultimately be.

This is the benefit of regular feedback. It provides a constant sounding board against which to measure progress, to adjust where necessary, and to celebrate the goals achieved along the way.

The Year 1s had a fantastic time at Taronga Zoo on Tuesday. Not only was it an enjoyable time of learning fascinating facts outside the classroom environment, but they also enjoyed the morning in each other's company. We are truly fortunate to have such a rich source of nature's wonders right on our doorstep, and it provided plenty to discuss when the students returned to school.


We wish our top swimmers everything of the best as they compete in the ASISSA Championships on Thursday. We look forward to hearing news of their successes. On Friday, the Year 5 and 6 students have their first incursion of the year to anticipate, as they will be amazed and entertained by the wonders of Science.

A number of our students are keen Nippers and this past weekend many of them competed at the well-attended carnival at Redhead Beach, near Newcastle. ## What an exciting week it was in Year 3!

On Tuesday, all students from Year $2-6$ attended their first, big sporting event of 2021: The Swimming Carnival! There were huge smiles, loud cheers and tremendous amounts of sportsmanship as the Year 3 students launched themselves into each event. There was also fierce competition between each of the houses but at the end of the day, all students should be congratulated on their enthusiasm and zealousness to get involved. It was great to see everyone having so much fun!

Academically, Year 3 continued to stream ahead with their History Cycle test on Wednesday. It was fantastic to hear about the different study techniques being used at home to revise. Many students were eager to share how much they could remember about 'Australian History Before Settlement', even before sitting their test!

Finally, all of the Year 3 students ended the week by watching the Year 6 Induction Assembly. This was a very special occasion for the Year 6 leadership team and a fantastic opportunity for Year 3 to get a glimpse into the exciting responsibilities that are in store for them, later into their primary years at Reddam.


## YEAR 4

It has been a super fun week this week in Year 4. The Swimming Carnival allowed us to showcase our aquatic skills and team sportsmanship on Tuesday. We cheered on our houses and supported our friends throughout the day.

In History, we have been focussing on life in Britain in the 1700s. It has been interesting to compare our lives now to the problems people experience in Great Britain, which in turn led to Captain Cook's mistake in declaring that this land was Terra Nullius. The declaration of Terra Nullius meant the British government believed they could colonise Australia and claim it as their own. They considered the continent an empty land and treated Aboriginal peoples who lived here without any human rights.

Our camp back at the beginning of term has tied in wonderfully with this unit. We were fortunate enough to listen to some indigenous women discuss the importance of the land in their culture and looked at items made by Aboriginal people for everyday life. This included a hollowed piece of tree which could be used to carry a baby, scoop up soil or carry produce when hunting and gathering. We also looked at how Captain Cook arrived dressed in European clothing compared to the indigenous people who used animal skins and fur which were warm and waterproof when turned inside out. Finally, we have discussed differences and similarities between the way Europeans and Aboriginal peoples farmed land and sourced food in the past. Remembering this information has helped us have a better understanding of how the indigenous people felt when Captain Cook first arrived in Botany Bay.


## YEAR 5 ENGLISH

This week, Year 5 practised writing conclusions to prepare for their upcoming persuasive writing assessment. In class we looked at a variety of persuasive techniques to embed within their writing to encourage the audience to agree with their argument. Below is a paragraph we analysed in class together, which looks at how the writer has used these devices in their writing.

To conclude, it is a clear as a lion's roar that it is cruel to keep animals in cages and zoos as it reduces their rate of survival when released in the wild. In addition, it is inhuman when forcing them to perform and finally, it leads to depression in animals. Imagine yourself, trapped in an enclosure, unable to roam freely as you perform the same routine day after day. Is this just? Would you want this for yourself? No! Therefore, it is important that animals are freed from their imprisonment as they belong in the wild.

Zoe Ching - "Lots of rhetorical questions have been used, like 'would you want this for yourself?', to really make the reader feel empathetic towards their argument."


## YEAR 5 \& 6 MATHEMATICS

This week, our Year 5 Mathematics students multiplied base numbers by themselves according to the exponent. They realised that the exponent tells how many times to multiply the base. The students soon became experts at determining the numerical value of expressions. They also worked on writing expressions in expanded form, rather than providing a numerical value. They learned that when bases are raised to the power of 2 it is called 'squaring' and if a base is raised to the power of 3 it is called 'cubing'. This was then linked back to the concept of square and cubic numbers and how these are related to area and volume respectively.

Our Year 6 mathematicians learned about the Cartesian Plane. They used their knowledge of ordered pairs to plot co-ordinates on all for quadrants of a grid. They realised the importance of reading the x-axis before the $y$-axis. Much joy was derived from plotting ordered pairs to make interesting dot to dot figures. This study was further explored with the introduction of integers. Students compared and ordered integers and discussed how these are used in everyday life.


## YEAR 5 \& 6 SCIENCE

This week in Science, Year 5 investigated natural selection through the Darwin's finches experiment. Students discovered why there was such a variety of finches on the Galapagos islands, but only one type of finch per island. Students discovered that the finches were perfectly adapted to their environment, as each island was slightly different. They used tweezers and forceps to replicate birds' beaks whilst trying to move a variety of different shaped items, which represented the seeds the finches would have tried to eat.

Students in Year 6 this week explored wet mounts. They successfully prepared a wet mount and focused it under a microscope to observe yeast. Students were amazed at the detail the microscopes can produce. For many students it was their first time using a microscope and they did exceptionally well. This is a skill they will take with them into Year 7.

In Science Club this week students investigated if a helicopter's rotor size affects how well it spins. Students made different sized rotors and dropped them from a height. They discovered that the rotor needs to be large in order to catch the air and fly!


## YEAR 6 ENGLISH

In Year 6 we continued to practise our descriptive writing to prepare for the upcoming in-class task next week. Students have been thinking of potential literary devices to use to create vivid imagery in their writing.

George Vucic - "I am thinking of using the simile 'As tall as ancient titans the mountains stood'."
Tali Ereira - "I would like to use alliteration in my writing, something like 'Ravenous Rabbits scurried through the dirt'."

Gabriella Hassan - "I am trying to build up my vocabulary and am going to try to use words like 'eerie' instead of 'creepy'."


## MUSIC

In Music this week, Year 3 students began working on their xylophone performance of 'Dinah.' 'Dinah' is a short Orff piece which has students practise playing semi quaver rhythms. Students learned how to use alternating mallet strokes to play the semiquavers in order to achieve a clear and accurate sound. The Year 3 students also practised two bar rhythmic and melodic dictations using ta, ti ti, sa and tika tika rhythm values and do, mi, so and la tone sets.

## MUSIC PERFORMANCE

As we pass the halfway point of the term, our thanks go to all parents and caregivers for supporting our extensive programme. Students have been diligently taking their instruments home for practise rather than storing them at school, and attendance and participation in ensembles has been exemplary. We will shortly announce the opening of entries for our Instrumental Competition, which will feature a range of categories for different instrument types, and sections each for K-2 and 3-6.

## Electronic Music Production

Each week in EMP, we have started class with a short discussion around a new music production technique, mostly to do with creating drum beats. The students have shown a genuine interest in the lesson materials. As Term 1 moves along, students will explore different genres and the instruments appropriate to each style. This class is a wonderful way to end the week, for students and teacher alike. We learn, we create, we share, we have fun.

## Year 3-4 Synthesiser Ensemble

The Year 3-4 Synthesiser Ensemble is a group created to provide ensemble playing opportunities for piano students. Students use midi keyboards hooked up to GarageBand to recreate the sound of different instruments used in pop songs. Over the last few weeks, the Year 3 and 4 group has welcomed a handful of new students, and we have been spending time introducing them to the technical set up. We have also been working on our first song of the year, 'Counting Stars' by OneRepublic. This is a challenging first song, with a very syncopated melody line. Although we have only had a few rehearsals, the ensemble is already able to play through most of the song with a good sense of togetherness. We are all looking forward to an exciting year ahead!
