KINDERGARTEN

It was fantastic to see the kids return to school this week with big smiles on their faces, excited to see their friends and ready to learn. Our Kindergarten students are growing up so quickly!

During our History lessons this week, we learnt about ANZAC Day and remembered the fallen soldiers and the men and women who served our country. In English, students shared lots of wonderful stories about their school holiday adventures including trips to Byron Bay, going to the theatre and riding bikes with their families. Students tried their hand at writing a recount of the school holidays and focussed on remembering to use a capital letter, a full stop and finger spaces when forming a sentence.

This week in Mathematics, students revised how to form their numbers correctly from one to ten and they used different strategies to solve addition questions. A range of resources were used to solve their addition problems including dominoes, counters, number lines and ten frames.

Kindergarten had a fantastic week and we look forward to another great term ahead!










YEAR 1

This week we welcomed back our wonderful and refreshed Year 1 students. The excitement and enthusiasm were a delight to see!

In Mathematics this week, Year 1 explored the topic of multiplication. The children demonstrated excellent understanding, identifying the multiplication operation and using counters and cubes to create practical arrays. This gave the students a visual representation of rows and columns and repeated addition. They also used this knowledge to identify how multiplication is used in our daily lives.

In Science, we began our new topic of 'Changing Skies and Landscapes.' It was impressive to see the students' records of observable changes that occur in the sky and landscape. Science involves observing, asking questions about, and describing changes in objects and events and the children's inquisitive minds are most certainly proving

The Year 2 classrooms were an exciting place to be on Tuesday morning. It was clearly evident that the students were enthusiastic to be reunited with their peers at school. The children were busy engaging in non-stop chatter and enjoyed sharing their holiday experiences.

The students were extremely interested when learning about the significance of ANZAC Day in preparation for the assembly to commemorate this special event. In Geography this week we enjoyed learning about the seven continents of the world. We identified them on Google and on maps as well as sharing our connections with countries around the globe.

Our Maths lessons involved number patterns and sequences, as well as consolidating our multiplication knowledge utilising arrays. Hands-on activities were valuable for our learning experiences.

During English lessons we discussed different types of sentences. We identified the difference between statements, exclamations and questions. We brainstormed ways to improve our writing by making it more descriptive. This week the students were keen to share holiday news presentations focussing on the structure of a recount.

Well done Year 2. We are looking forward to a wonderful term ahead!







The Year 3 classrooms were a joyful place to be this week, as the students returned to school buzzing with excitement and enthusiasm for the term ahead. There was no hesitation to readily get back into the swing of things and the Year 3s had a thrilling first week of school.

In Mathematics, the students wowed their teachers with their understanding of formal, written addition and subtraction strategies. They learnt how to correctly structure algorithms and to trade digits between the place value columns.

In English, the Year 3s continued to use their powers of persuasion to write exposition texts. They used PEEL paragraphs (Point, Explain, Example, Link) to substantiate their arguments and they gave facts and opinions to further persuade their reader.

A continuation of topics in Science and History saw the students broaden their understanding of 'The Earth's Surface' and 'Before Contact'.

A fantastic start to what is certainly going to be an amazing term!









YEAR 4


The Year 4 teachers would like to welcome all students back to the classroom. After a well-deserved rest, students are ready to reignite the learning process. This week, they enjoyed an introduction into their new focus areas for Term 2. It gave students a brilliant opportunity to gain a broader insight into what lies ahead over the course of the next few weeks.

During Science, students began to look at the properties of different materials in our topic – "Package It Better!". By learning a new range of scientific vocabulary, students could discuss whether materials were porous or waterproof, malleable or rigid. So, parents and carers, make sure to be on the look-out for some hands-on investigations and exciting write-ups about the material world in future newsletters.

In Geography, we started our unit – "Places are Similar and Different". Primarily focussing on using geographical tools (such as maps, census data and even Google Earth), students will be able to compare and contrast Australia's neighbouring countries. There will even be an exciting trip to Centennial Parklands in week 3 to help develop these map reading skills.

What an exciting return and even more exciting weeks to come!









YEAR 5 ENGLISH

In Year 5 English this week, students revised persuasive and narrative text structures in preparation for NAPLAN. We also began a unit on storybooks that represent the experience of refugees and difficult journeys. We began the work of considering our place in a sometimesfragile world, studying visual literacy, and writing narratives about journeys and adventures. Year 5 students are full of beans after their holidays, and seem ready for a busy term.

YEAR 5 PUBLIC SPEAKING

In Year 5 Public Speaking we began our new unit on spoken poetry. We watched some different examples of sung or spoken poetry, and asked the question what is poetry? This week I introduced students to a poem full of beautiful figurative language. We annotated this poem to understand its structure better. Year 5 will soon be creating their own poems to perform to the class. Costumes are encouraged!

YEAR 6 ENGLISH

In Year 6 English this week, students began a unit on advertising as a communication medium. We considered what makes a good advertisement, and how advertisers convince us through text and image. Students also started their study of visual literacy and the persuasive devices logos, ethos and pathos. Students' responses to the study materials have been very mature and insightful.



YEAR 5 & 6 MATHEMATICS

Recapping from last term, Year 5 made a clear distinction between perimeter and area. Students were encouraged to find efficient ways of counting when determining area. They counted the number of squares in one row and multiplied this by the number of columns. They then began to generalise their methods to calculate the areas of rectangle, including squares. Algebraic formulas were introduced as part of the process for calculating area. As students became more competent, they were easily able to calculate the area of composite shapes.

Students communicated using words such as 'dimensions', 'length' and 'width'. They learned that the abbreviation \mathbf{m}^2 is read as 'square metres' and not metres squared.

In Year 6, students established a real reference for the square kilometre and the hectare by locating an area of one square kilometre and one hectare on a local map. They saw the difference between a hectometre and a hectare and were able to make the connection that 1 hm x I hm is equal to a hectare which is $11 000 \text{ m}^2$. After listing the factors of 11 000, Year 6 mathematicians were challenged to find as many different dimensions as possible for rectangular plots of lands equating to a hectare.










YEAR 5 & 6 SCIENCE

Welcome back to all Year 5 and 6 students. I hope they are ready for a term full of experiments and for their new topic of the Material World. This week, both Year 5 and 6 students explored states of matter. This is Year 5's first time studying this topic, whilst for Year 6 this week will act as refresher before delving into the Year 6 content. Studying states of matter this week involved students identifying what a solid, liquid and gas are and how to recognise these states of matter by their properties and characteristics.

Science club


This term students will be partaking in a solar system project! Students already did their research about their chosen planet in this week's Science Club, meaning in the upcoming weeks they will begin to make and create a 3D model of their planet!













MUSIC

Term 2 has begun actively in Music classrooms, with Year 1 learning an Orff song called 'Starlight' in their first lesson back. Once students learnt to sing the lyrics, they then added actions. Students then learnt the solfege syllables and rhythm time names to go with the song. See if any of the Year 1 students can sing this song to you! "Starlight, star bright, first star I see tonight. Wish I may, wish I might, have the wish I wish tonight." In the second half of the lesson, students listened to the song 'Little Birds.' They discussed the features of the piece and what they liked or didn't like about it. Well done to all our Music students for a great start to Term 2.



The Orff Ensemble is in essence an extension of what is learned in the K-2 Music classroom, and this week the students revised their Curwen hand signs and solfa through some call and response singing. We also revised some of our songs from last term and made sure that we were using our xylophones with beautiful mallet technique. Moving forward, the students are keen and ready to start learning some fun new repertoire.

Year 3-4 Synthesiser Ensemble

After a great start to the year in Term 1, students in the Year 3-4 Synth Ensemble have settled into their roles within the ensemble nicely. The students are all displaying a good sense of understanding of the required technical set up and are creating a great sound out of their instruments. This term, students are working on the song 'Thunder' by Imagine Dragons. For this song, several students have had the opportunity to change to a different part from what they were playing last term. The students are sounding very impressive and cannot wait to demonstrate the finished product.

Ursula's new release, Pierre's Not There, follows a young girl who gets caught up in a magical puppet theatre. Part prose and part script, with beautiful illustrations by Christopher Nielsen, it explores the mysteries of the imagination and tells its story in a unique and captivating way.

In honour of Ursula's second year as Laureate, a competition has been created for students all around Australia! They are challenging you to put on your creative hat and think about how you can tell a story in a new and exciting way.

THE CHALLENGE:

- 1) Imagine you were putting on a play or puppet show inspired by Pierre's Not There (though you can include characters from Ursula's other books, if you like!).
- 2) Write a scene that continues the characters' adventures, sets the stage for their original story, or puts them in a new situation (no minimum length, but no more than 500 words).
- 3) Show us how you would perform your scene by including some puppet designs draw them or make them with spare crafting materials.


