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Dear Parents and Caregivers,

We hope that all our families enjoyed spending time together last Sunday, on Mother's Day, as you honoured the mums and other special women in the children's lives. Every now and then it is good to break from our everyday routines to celebrate someone, because in so doing we are reminded how fortunate we are to share our lives with special people. The richness of family relationships is enhanced even more when we take time to make someone's day special and when we remind her, or him, what they mean to us.

Relationships are at the heart of our lives. As poet John Donne reminds us, we aren't isolated islands, floating along independent of each other. But rather, the true value of life is to be found in our interconnectedness, in our shared experiences. and yes, also in honouring the differences which make each of us unique.

We see this in the school environment, in the excited and sincere greetings as the students arrive each morning; in the empathy and understanding which the teachers show towards those in their classes – and towards each other; in the very real way in which we share collective victories (and disappointments) sometimes as community. As I have said before, one of the great privileges we as teachers have is to be part of a community which is inherently positive, forward looking and kind. Schools really are very special places, and I'd like to believe that our focus on honouring the individuality of all those in the community makes ours especially so.

It is also true, however, that children today are faced with a barrage of contradictory information of how relationships should be conducted. Amidst the noise of social media, television and various online platforms, frequently the message seems to be that relationships are fickle and that they can be established and then broken with impunity. In a consumerist society such as ours, it is an unfortunate





truth that relationships are often also treated like a commodity to be bought, exchanged and discarded.

The reading books and works of literature which the teachers choose for their students to study are often ideal starting points to discuss relationships. Students are able to see both destructive, as well as positive, affirming relationships at work – and to note the implications of each. They are able to delve vicariously into the thoughts and emotions of and to live through characters relationships. Discussions which take place in class allow some distance between the characters in a novel and the students' own real-life experiences, but at the same time they provide an avenue to understand the complexity of relationships and to apply them to their own lives.

This past week was a busy one in the Primary School. Not only were there all the usual academic, cultural and sporting activities on offer but the annual Whole School Ballet Performance also took place at the NIDA Theatre – and what a spectacle it was! From the youngest dancers to the most accomplished, each performance wowed the appreciative audience. The colourful costumes and lighting enhanced the whole event and it really was a week to remember for the dancers and all who attended. Our heartiest congratulations to all involved dancers. teachers. parents. backstaae workers - it really was a massive team effort. Finally, while still on a congratulatory note, we were thrilled this week when our specialist English teacher Dr Kate Sumner doffed her doctoral cap at a long-awaited graduation ceremony at the University of NSW. Kate's PhD thesis, called "Thomas Chatterton and the Performance of Literary Professionalism" was completed through the UNSW Faculty of Arts and Social Sciences, funded by a prestigious Australian Government Postgraduate Award Scholarship. Her funding included two research trips to the western manuscripts reading room at the British Library, in London. Kate's thesis explores the textual, visual and antiquarian ventures of that "marvellous boy", mid-eighteenth-century English adolescent poet Thomas Chatterton. It argues for the significance of Chatterton's idiosyncratic literary experimentation as a means of professional self-promotion, in the context of the emerging self-confidence, and simultaneous anxieties and ambitious failures of the creative underclasses of mid-century Georgian English society. We share Kate's excitement as she celebrates this very special achievement – we are indeed fortunate to have someone of her calibre on our staff.

The Year 3 and 5 students had an especially full week, as they wrote their NAPLAN tests from Tuesday to Thursday. They approached these with a calm resolve to show off all their academic skills and the teachers were very impressed with their efforts. The Year 4s had a far more relaxing time on Wednesday, as they enjoyed their excursion to the beautiful Centennial Parklands.

The final **Parent/Teacher meetings** took place on Tuesday evening, for parents of those in Year 3 and 4. My thanks to all parents and teachers for the pragmatic and thorough way in which these meetings were conducted. I have no doubt that they will pay dividends during the remainder of the year, as we assist the students to do their very best.

This past week saw the first of several **Examination Readiness Workshops** which will be conducted for the Year 3s, with the remaining workshops continuing next week. These workshops are an invaluable part of the scaffolding which we place around the students in

# **KINDERGARTEN**

We had a very busy week in Kindergarten. Our ballet girls were so excited to be performing in their first concert at Reddam. After many hours of practice, the final week arrived. We set off to the theatre and they enjoyed seeing all their hard work coming together, as we participated in the final rehearsals, the finale and trying on our beautiful tutus. The evening performances were wonderful and undoubtedly will be remembered by our little ballerinas for a long time. Well done girls, we certainly were very proud of every one of you.

Whilst we were dancing, we continued working hard at school. We learnt the letters k and v. We worked diligently, learning to apply all our letter sounds to our spelling so that we can independently write a sentence or two, and completed our first independent recount. There is so much to remember – our full stops, capital letters and finger spaces.

In Mathematics this week, we continued to consolidate our subtraction skills and practised taking away numbers using tens frames, counters, fingers and the number line. We played a game of bowling using 10 cups and found out how many were left standing when we knocked the cups down. We can now record our number sentences with accuracy as well.



# **KINDERGARTEN**

We had some wonderful Dreamtime Stories presented during our Show and Tell this week. They made storyboards, posters, models and their audiences were enthralled listening to these varied tales, which have been passed down over generations. We also looked at the three flags of Australia and had a detailed look at the words of our national anthem. It was interesting to learn and understand each line of this special song. It will make the song much more meaningful when we sing it each week in assembly.









In Mathematics this week the students spent time working with money. The students ordered coins and notes based on their value as well as totalling amounts during various shopping games. They were able to draw links between their previous knowledge of skip counting and addition when working out total amounts.

In English we continued to work on improving the quality of our sentence writing by including the correct punctuation and expanding our use of descriptive language. The students also basked in the opportunity to make a jam sandwich following a procedure. They are beginning to notice the importance of 'bossy verbs' when following instructions.









In Science we learned about the four seasons and notable changes associated with them. The students were able to describe the activities, clothing and changes in nature they would expect in the spring, summer, autumn and winter. Abi enjoys wrapping up warmly in the winter while Ivy enjoys visiting the beach and wearing cool clothes in the summer.


In PDH students discussed the importance of safety around cars whether parked or otherwise. They were aware that cars may unexpectedly move in a car park and they also described why playing on a driveway near a car is not the safest option!

Finally, the ballet students danced with pride and precision at NIDA this week and we are all extremely proud of their efforts.









Week 3 in Year 2 has been full of activity across the curriculum. The students were so excited to be able to participate in the Cross-Country carnival on Monday, along with preparations for the ballet concert this week.

In Mathematics the focus was on exploring the connection between addition and subtraction, recognising, and understanding halves and quarters along with identifying angles.

Our Geography unit of work has highlighted where we are in our world, from local, national, and international perspectives. The students enjoyed using Google Earth to pinpoint locations and it gave us a sense of scale.

In Science this week we learned all about the water cycle and how it never ends! The students can tell all about evaporation, condensation, precipitation and absorption.

Year 2 refined their sentence writing skills in English and can locate the subject and predicate in a sentence, identify what type of sentence is written and can write interesting sentences using correct punctuation and interesting adjectives for description. In our speaking and listening time we enjoyed hearing all about famous landmarks both in Australia and from around the world.













Congratulations Year 3 on such a wonderful week!

On Tuesday, all Year 3 students sat their first NAPLAN assessment: Writing. They were given the topic of 'Footprints, tracks and trails.' It was very pleasing to hear all of their wonderful ideas after the session and we hope that the NAPLAN markers enjoy reading these creative pieces. Their next three NAPLAN tests were sat on the computer. All students are to be congratulated for their effort and diligence during these sessions.

Additionally, this week, Year 3 ran their cross-country race, after the official day was cancelled due to wet weather. It was a splendidly sunny day and all students enjoyed getting involved.









This week was an exciting week for Year 4 with a wealth of different activities. One of the highlights of the week included the Year 4 excursion to Centennial Parklands. This class excursion provided children with an opportunity to develop their skills in Geography and in particular – map reading. Additionally, students were able to build upon their social skills such as teamwork and collaboration.

Using the BOLTSS acronym, students were able to look at a map and determine the following:

- **B:** Borders identifying and locating the borders of a particular area.
- O: Orientation knowing where the area is located by giving the cardinal points on a compass.
- L: Legend using a key to identify key features of a place.
- **T:** Title explaining the purpose of the map.
- S: Scale understanding how much smaller the map is in real life.
- **S:** Source appreciating where the map came from.

Through discussion, children learnt how Geography can be applied to other subjects and reallife events. Being able to read a map can help others navigate a given space, assist you in finding direction and most importantly can stop you getting lost! What a fantastic skill to learn at such a young age!







# **YEAR 5 ENGLISH**

The Year Five classes have been learning about visual literacy through novels focussing on migration; namely 'The Journey' and 'The Little Refugee'. They are deconstructing, interpreting and decoding the images and identifying the narrative developed through images. Here is a five class independently doing a booklet on analysing images.

# YEAR 6 ENGLISH

This week, the Year 6 classes continued to develop their knowledge, understand, analysis and application of the persuasive techniques used in advertisements. The focus this week was on presentational features as well as ethos, pathos and logos in advertising and the way that these combine as a final product to persuade people to purchase their products or ideas. The students learned that that the art of advertising is extremely technical.



# YEAR 5 & 6 MATHEMATICS

Year 5 used the inverse operations to work backwards to assist with the solution of an equation. Each operation was reversed to get back to the beginning. We discussed that working backwards usually means that you start at the end and go towards the start. Isabella Winkler gave the example that, if you lost your keys, then you would start at the last place you were and keep retracing your steps until you find them. In this instance, you would be working backwards to find your keys. Mathematicians tirelessly and persistently worked backwards to solve many 'What number did I start with?' equations.

In Year 6 students were given a mystery number and a series of operations to perform to get to an answer. They wrote the situation as an equation using the variable x. They worked their

way backwards to get \* by itself. When solving a two-step equation, they learned that when working backwards, they will always need to 'undo' the addition and subtraction before multiplication and division. Last week's topic, 'the order of operations', tied in nicely - students were working backwards so they performed BIDMAS backwards. This proved to be a satisfying lesson as we made connections between learned concepts.









# YEAR 5 & 6 SCIENCE

In Science this week, Year 6 students explored the characteristics and properties of different materials. They considered why we use particular materials for certain roles and the consequences of using the wrong material. Year 6 students also demonstrated an understanding of chemical and physical changes in materials and the characteristics and properties that make up these changes.

Year 5 used their scientific knowledge from the past few lessons to take part in practical experiments to identify mixtures and new substances. Students worked on a carousel of practical activities to establish if, when mixed with water, what certain substances would do.

# Science club

The planets are beginning to take shape! Students' creations received their first coat of papier maché last week and their second coat this week. Even though one planet did not make it through its first layer of papier maché, students were determined to succeed and created a second design quickly. If students continue at this rate the solar system should be complete in a couple of weeks.











# **MUSIC**

In Music this week, Year 3 students began their lesson by singing a lovely Ghanaian folk song called 'Sansa Kroma'. Students first sang the song in unison, then sang it as a round. The Year 3 Music students all completed their xylophone performances of last week, therefore, after their vocal warm up, it was onto some listening analysis and rhythm dictation activities. Students practised listening to, clapping and notating numerous 2 bar rhythms using the rhythm set, ta, taa, ti ti, tika tika and sa. They then listened to 'Under Pressure' by Queen and David Bowie and used the Six Concepts of Music to analyse the sona.

Another reminder about entries for our **Vocal Competition**. This is also being run using an online format, and videos are due by 3pm Friday in Week 4.


# Year 5-6 Synth Ensemble


