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Dear Parents and Caregivers,

The weekly newsletters often contain feedback about our students who have made the choice to live out the school motto of 'We Shall Give Back'. There are some who give up their holidays to pack meals at Our Big Kitchen, while others have come up with initiatives of their own to make a difference in the lives of others. In the end, such efforts come down to a personal decision to reach out and to use one's time, effort and sometimes money to do something sacrificially for someone else.

While we at the school, and you as parents and caregivers, might encourage the children we care for to be empathetic and kind, ultimately it is up to them to put that into practice. There can surely be few moments which elicit more warm-hearted pride in a parent than to see a child spontaneously showing kindness and generosity to someone else, especially where that hasn't been prompted by an adult.

American poet, Henry David Thoreau, once asked, "Could a greater miracle take place than for us to look through each other's eyes for an instant?" This is exactly what one of our students did recently – and what she encouraged others to do as well. **Mia Cohen**, in Year 5, has a brother Luca, who attends St Lucy's School.

However, last year Mia spoke with me after some of her friends asked about her brother and about why he was so different. Most of all, she wanted them to know more about children with special needs, in order to understand their challenges and to know how special they are. She really was, in Thoreau's words, looking through the eyes of another, and she wanted others to do the same. As a result, we set up an opportunity for her to speak her Year 4 peers. So well was her talk received back then that a week ago she spoke to an even wider audience: the students at both the K-2 and 3-6 assemblies.






It cannot be overstated just how well her talk was received and we were all immensely proud of her bravery to stand up in front of her peers, as well as older students, to give them an insight into someone else's life. The students were given a glimpse into the challenges which Luca faces each day but also how these impact on those around him. It was another reminder of the preciousness of life and of how every life matters.

We have been proud to support Mia's fundraising efforts in support of St Lucy's School through our gold coin fundraiser, and we have matched the considerable amount which Mia and her mum raised by selling beautiful trinkets. However, even more than that, we hope that the sincerity of Mia's words to the students will touch a chord deep inside each of them, to produce a groundswell of kindness, empathy and generosity.

One way in which we hope to do this as a school is through the YOU CAN SIT WITH ME campaign, which we will be piloting in our school. YOU CAN SIT WITH ME is an inclusive kindness campaign and anti-bullying initiative that helps children who are feeling a bit down and lost during free play periods find someone to be with, while giving students an opportunity to take on a caring role and help their peers. Each day, one interested student from each class will have an opportunity to wear a yellow 'YOU CAN SIT WITH ME' bracelet that signals to others that they are welcome to respectfully join their play that day, no questions asked. At the end of the day, the bracelet is returned and the responsibility shifts to another student. In line with our work on promoting consent and having the confidence to speak your mind, wearing the bracelet will be completely voluntary and students will have an opportunity to say no on the day if they are not feeling up to the task or have too much on their plate.

Care for others also extends to our care for the environment and for the animals with which we share the planet. As such, we were pleased to host a **Muffi Day** on Tuesday this week in support of the **Australian Rhino Project**. A number of our students are extremely passionate about wildlife conservation and it was good for them to be





able to put this into action by supporting the incredible work done by this organisation. Incredibly, Reddam House students managed to raise \$968.20 in support, special thanks to everyone involved!

On Tuesday evening, we held the muchanticipated Finals **Evening** to our **2021 Instrumental Competition**. We heard from 45 soloists who received the highest overall marks in the first stage of our competition. We are very proud of all the students for their preparation and excellent performances - the standard across all age groups was incredibly high. KINDERGARTEN

This week, we began our new Show and Tell topic. We discovered some of the amazing destinations around Australia. Some of these places have been visited and some are only a distant dream of places that we would like to visit. The students created some great posters full of interesting facts. They are beginning to demonstrate some good presentation skills and delivered their topics with increasing confidence.

Writing is an important skill that provides us with a powerful means of communicating with other people. We use writing in all aspects of our lives and to become effective communicators, our children need to develop a range of writing skills. The teachers were incredibly proud of our children's efforts this week as every single pupil attempted to independently write their first recount about their weekend. We revised and consolidated all our initial sounds and sight words this week as well. It is incredible to see how much progress each child has made, not only in their academic strands, but in their maturity and independence too!

In Mathematics, we revisited subtraction, addition and number recognition. Our students used different methods to demonstrate their problem-solving skills. From using a number line or ten frames or counters to drawing pictures to solve a word problem, there was no stopping them this week!




YEAR 1

This week in Year 1 we continued to look at our skies and observe the weather. The children made wind vanes to go with their rain gauges. We are becoming quite the collective of meteorologists!

In Mathematics, we studied area and capacity. The children enjoyed creating their own robot images and calculating the area of the different body parts. They then used their addition skills to find the total area of their robots. Capacity went with a splash as we explored the quantity of water that different vessels can take. Short and wide or tall and thin there were some tricky ones to order in relation to their capacity!










YEAR 1

Grammar led us to look at sentence types, commands, exclamations, questions and statements. It got quite bossy as we started throwing commands around the classroom. The children had fun changing statements into questions and becoming familiar with the useful collection of who, what, where, when, and why.

We continued our procedural writing by writing instructions on how to make delicious smoothies. Of course, we made some - delicious and nutritious, our favourite!

History and Geography led us to exploring the care of our beautiful land and all of our environments. The children are very aware and conscientious with their attitude towards the care of nature and even our classroom environments. It is great to see what the future will likely hold with them at the helm.



The Year 2 students further developed their ability to describe a character or a setting with the help of adjectives and adverbs to make the reader feel like they are really there. After reading 'Leonard the Lyrebird' by Jodie McLeod, which was written and illustrated in the Blue Mountains, we used our senses to help guide what we would hear, see, feel and smell if we were there in the Blue Mountains, too. We can now use our senses to guide our descriptions of a variety of settings.

In describing the setting of Vietnam in 'The Little Refugee' we had a lot of great descriptions including this from **Jayden Thomson**: "Five citizens were squashed onto one little motorbike, trying to zoom away from the strong soldiers. I was one of the citizens. The brown dust gathered on the rough ground, separating to the gloomy, brown sun. The clouds grew darker and darker. Now, we could hear footsteps and shouting behind us..."

In Mathematics, we really focussed on our ability to read the time using 'quarter past', 'half past' and 'quarter to'. We even built a giant clock face on the floor and took turns at being the minute hand making quarter turns!


In Geography, we shared our connections to places. We all feel connected to Sydney because it is where we live, but we discovered we all feel connected to at least one other place too. Some reasons include places we always visit on holidays, places our parents grew up, where we have relatives and other places at which we have made special memories.



YEAR 2







The Year 3s headed off to Botany Bay with their caps on their heads and their excursion bags filled with great goodies to eat, and any other 'essential' they thought they may need for the day. We arrived just in time to enjoy a recess snack surrounded by the beautiful Botany Bay surrounds and views. The Year 3s leant about Australian History both before and after the arrival of the British on Australian soil.

Students explored the point of first contact between Aboriginal people and white settlers. They learnt how Aboriginal people survived in their environment by examining a collection of preserved Australian animals and Aboriginal artifacts. They learnt about Aboriginal culture. Students also learnt about the European history of the site through stories and original architecture and identify some of the consequences of the British arrival for Aboriginal people.







The day ended with a lovely lunch break on lush green lawns surrounding the old schoolhouse, before returning to Reddam House.

The Year 4 students relished the richness of their learning this week!

From the peaks of persuasive public speaking to the sensation of scientific investigation, the Year 4 students reached new heights in their appreciation of learning about the world around them. They showed enthusiasm and wonder during the challenging and creative absorbency, impact and elasticity experiments. Additionally, the public speaking presentations certainly set the bar high! Well done Year 4!

The Year 4 students enjoyed the physical and practical studies in Science this week, through investigating and exploring the properties of materials. Students were given the opportunity to witness the absorbency of different materials, such as plastic wrap, tissue and Chux wipes. They were also given the chance to test the durability, strength and protective nature of three materials: paper, cardboard and bubble wrap. Students dropped a 1kg weight on a cracker to witness what impact the force would have on it. Let us just say that a little Sao goes a long way – my what a mess but so much fun!

In Public Speaking, the Term 2 unit aimed to provide students with the skills required for speaking well in public. The focus for their term task was on writing and delivering persuasive speeches. A secondary focus was on communication in general, improving social intelligence, emotional awareness as well as self-confidence. We covered topics including (but not limited to): counselling skills, reading others' mental and emotional states, decoding social situations, and connecting with people emotionally at both an audience and interpersonal level. The students excelled in capturing the audience's attention, understanding their audience's needs and calling their audience to action.

Well done, Year 4. You were compelling and persuasive!

Finally, a huge congratulations to 4D who gave an impeccable class presentation this week. Their positive and uplifting assembly was a great way to end the week. What a wonderful reminder to keep dreaming, Year 4 – dreams do come true!






YEAR 5 ENGLISH

Year 5 are a talented, conscientious and highly motivated group, achieving success in developing Visual Literacy skills in English. Year 5 have developed confidence in expressing their abilities to read and comprehend visual texts. The effort and pride in their learning of new concepts within visual literacy is highly commendable. Year 5 have appreciated the themes communicated to them while reading and analysing the book 'The Journey' by Francesca Sanna. Year 5 have gained knowledge about themselves, other people and the world around them.

YEAR 6 ENGLISH

Year 6 have been working hard to achieve the outcomes of the 'Advertising' unit; showing signs of increasing confidence in identifying visual techniques used in Advertising. Year 6 should be congratulated for the way the cohort are developing a more mature understanding of difficult concepts discussed in class. Year 6 are enjoying the challenge of applying their knowledge of Advertising techniques when analysing various advertisements. Well done Year 6 for the effort and pride evident in your written work, along with a positive attitude on class tasks.



YEAR 5 & 6 MATHEMATICS

In Year 5 we reinforced mental strategies for multiplication and division. Furthermore, students investigated the divisibility rules, which they realised are extremely powerful in determining factors and multiples. They also utilised these divisibility rules to distinguish between prime and composite numbers. Students used counters to model prime numbers and explained and reasoned why their arrays only had one row. Venn diagrams were also employed as a visual cue to identify the lowest common multiple and highest common factor of given numbers.

Using their prior knowledge of divisibility rules Year 6 mathematicians factorised numbers as products of their prime factors, writing their answers in index form. They used factor trees or the 'table method' as a tool. To gain a deeper understanding of the concepts, word problems dealing with real-life situations were explored.

Year 6 students compared and converted between 12- and 24-hour time and determined the duration of events. Linking their History unit, Eminent People, mathematicians ordered significant events in history according to the century in which they occurred. They discussed timelines and linked their knowledge of integers to the BCE and CE.









YEAR 5 & 6 SCIENCE

Year 5

In Science this week Year 5 explored the separation technique of chromatography. Chromatography is a method used to separate mixtures. It works when the substances in a mixture are soluble in the same solvent. Students carried out a practical activity to separate the inks in felt tip pens to see first-hand how the chromatography process works.


Year 6

Year 6 students unpacked the periodic table a little further this week. Students focused on the atomic number of each element and what it actually means. With this new information, students were able to draw the atomic structure of the first 1.5 elements.

Science club

After a couple of weeks of papier maché, the planets were ready to be painted. The students in Science Club have done amazingly well to get their planets to this stage and the planets are looking great. All the planets have now been hung from the ceiling in the Science classroom for all to see. Well done, Science Club, on this amazing effort.










MUSIC


