Dear Parents and Caregivers,

A calm and focused hush seemed to descend over the Primary School this past week, as the Year 3-6 students prepared for their **mid-year examinations**. The younger students also played their part, by keeping noise levels down, thereby ensuring that the atmosphere on campus was as conducive as possible for the exams to be written.

As I chatted with a few of the students during the week, I was impressed with their confidence and readiness to get started with the exams. The teachers also commented on their mature approach and on how well they were putting strategies in place to learn the content to be covered. As I have said before, assessments such as these really are a process.

The preparation is just as important as the actual writing of the exams. And then the feedback is equally important, as it gives the students satisfaction to see where they have done well, as well as the necessary guidance in areas where they can still improve. The staff and I wish the Year 3-6 students everything of the best for next week and we are sure that they will acquit themselves admirably, as they show off all that they have learned during the first half of the year.

The exam period is another reminder of times in our lives when we have choices of how we will respond. Times of challenge are inevitably the moments when we learn most about ourselves, and this is certainly so for the students, as they have to set time aside for studying, decide whether to ask for help, focus during the writing of the exams, and so on.

I was reminded of this idea of the choices we make when I read a powerful quote from Holocaust survivor and author, Viktor Frankl. He reminds us that, "Between stimulus and response there is a space. In that space is our power to choose our response. In our response lies our growth and our freedom."

Throughout our lives we are faced with situations, some more important than others, when we have to





make choices of how we will respond. This is no less true for the students at school, and we hope that we as teachers are on hand to support them through the decisions they make. At the moment, some of these choices might be whether to spend another hour studying instead of watching TV, or to raise a hand to ask for guidance from a teacher or parent.

There are also important choices they will make which may have implications for other people. Whether to stand up for a peer who is being bullied; whether to hold back on a hurtful word; whether to turn the other cheek when provoked – all these situations will require maturity and a decision to choose kindness instead of retaliation. It is our great hope that as they navigate their way through sometimes tricky personal situations, our students will make choices which honour others, and which develop young women and men for an even brighter future.

One person who has been excelling on the athletics track has been **Rhea Sotiras**, who recently came second in her 70m sprint race. She received her trophy at the **Little Athletics 2021 awards ceremony** last weekend, for which we congratulate her.

Recently, **Egor Grachev** competed for the first time in the **NSW Brazilian Jiu Jitsu Federation Autumn Cup 2021 – GI**. This is a 4-star event and part of the Australian rankings and NSW BJJ League rankings. Egor did exceptionally well to claim 2nd place in the Boys Gi/Yellow Orange Green belt/Junior III (12 y.o.)/Under 48.3 Kg Division. Well done, Egor!

Our **Reddam 11 netball team** is made up of both Year 5 and 6 students, some of whom are playing their first season of netball for Reddam House. KINDERGARTEN


C-A-T, B-A-T and M-A-T! Yes, we are rhyming. Kindergarten students have been looking at rhyming words, some of them real and some nonsense words! As we read a "Wocket in my Pocket," we had many laughs at some of the words Dr Seuss made up in order to get the words in his story to rhyme. This is such an important skill for reading and writing and it is great to see the children beginning to grasp this concept. We are right at the end of learning the alphabet. The students are becoming so quick at recognising their sounds and are blending them together beautifully to form words. Sentence writing continues to be a focus as we can see simple sentences being extended into more complex ones.

Maths has seen us becoming real number whizzes as we now work in the 0-20 number range and beyond. We have been ordering numbers, adding and subtracting, using the number lines and our ten frames. We have also practised our graphing as we collected data about Australian animals and recorded this information on a column graph. It was great fun using tally marks to record our numbers.

Our topic this week delved into the area of Aboriginal Art and with painstaking care we completed our dot paintings. It was great fun trying to use some of the symbols that the Aboriginal People used to tell our stories through pictures. We have continued to be taken to the most amazing destinations around Australia for our "Show and Tell". We visited Uluru, Bowral, Moree and The Great Barrier Reef and many other tourist hot spots. It certainly has piqued our interests to become intrepid travellers in our beautiful country.










This week in Year 1 we learned more about verbs in sentences. The students know they are action words and they put their drama skills to good use by acting out certain words in very animated ways! The students also shared some wonderful news presentations which focussed on our text type 'Procedures'. Rhea demonstrated how to play 'Giggle and Roll', a fantastic board game for two people, Ryan shared his delicious cookie recipe, Ivy demonstrated how to make fruit skewers and Ollie showed the class how to make high performing paper planes!









In Science, we read the story **Bringing the Rain to Kapiti Plain** by Verna Aardema. The students enjoyed listening to how Ki-pat brought rain to the drought-stricken Kapiti Plain. They then made zig zag books retelling the story.

In Mathematics we expanded our knowledge of place value using 2- and 3-digit numbers. We also explored positional language by playing games and using maps.









In Science this week Year 2 thought about how water vapour can form clouds, this being called 'condensation'. We demonstrated this during our 'Cloud in a Jar' experiment and observed how the water becomes 'precipitation' or rain once the cloud is too heavy with liquid. It was lots of fun to watch the blue colouring pass through the shaving cream like rain!

Problem solving was a focus in Mathematics with our daily word problems. Students thought carefully about the most important words in the problem to try to figure out how to solve it. We also focused on solving simple addition and subtraction problems using a range of efficient mental and written strategies. Year 2 are learning more about creating displays of data using lists, tables and picture graphs and how to interpret them.

In grammar the students learned about vocabulary expansion and choosing words carefully to improve writing. We continue to develop our descriptive writing with the use of interesting adjectives and compound sentences.

Our speaking and listening theme is 'Significant Scientists' and we enjoyed the various presentations the students prepared!












"I study my English and Maths using palm cards. My mum also quizzes me on topics and I have to answer her questions." **Eden Elski**


"Every day I've done a little bit of my Revision Booklet. I also read after school to build my reading." **Axel Briner**

YEAR 5 ENGLISH

As teachers, we are extremely aware of the anxieties of examinations; therefore, Revision Week is important. This week we revised the skills needed for reading comprehension, language conventions and writing. We reminded students to use Literacy Planet activities to help with the language conventions. For reading comprehension, if a passage is long and seems overwhelming, they should break it up into chunks according to paragraphs and summarise the information (this may be easier to understand). In doing an excellent piece of narrative writing, it is best not to delve too much into the background information; focus on ideas which will drive the plot forward; and remember that it needs a complication and resolution. Must the characters be humans? No. One of the best narrative pieces ever written used personification throughout – students should be creative, just as long as they write a response about the topic.

Revising is important, it will help to clarify any questions and concerns students might have. It will also help them to understand areas to improve and most importantly it will boost their confidence. We hope that this week serves all students well and we wish them all the best for next week.



YEAR 6 ENGLISH

We have just completed Revision Week, and I am sure that on countless occasions students must have asked their teachers and parents, "Why should I revise?"

This week, the Year Six classes were immersed in their revision. They consolidated their knowledge of language conventions, understanding of where and how improvements can be made in persuasive writing and how to write succinct answers for reading comprehension. What was impressive were the spirited debates about nuances in meanings when focussing on synonyms and antonyms as well as the discussions and analysis of the technicality in language conventions. Additionally, students engaged in teacher-student dialogues about how to best improve their persuasive writing. To be persuasive, they should remember to use the PEEL format. They shouldn't skim the surface; rather develop and explain every aspect of their evidence.

We hope that all students used this week to cement their knowledge of all aspects English related. So, the next time they ask themselves the question; hopefully they will think about Revision Week and think about all the improvements in their knowledge, skills and understanding; and the benefit these will have on their examinations. All the best to all students next week.

YEAR 5 & 6 MATHEMATICS

This week, being Revision Week, our mathematics classes focussed on consolidating learnt concepts and making connections between mathematical knowledge, ideas and understanding. During lessons, the students were provided with opportunities to ask questions and to apply their knowledge in preparation for their exams. Their revision booklets, which they had steadily worked through, were marked so that students were able to learn from their errors.

Emphasis was placed on the importance of having their theory books at hand, when studying, in order that they have a reference and worked examples to remind them of procedures and processes.

Exam techniques such as reading the questions carefully and extracting keywords were provided. Furthermore, students were reminded to manage their time well to check their answers and to revisit questions they may have been unable to answer initially.

Year 5 and 6 are to be congratulated on their excellent work ethic leading up to exam week. We wish them all the very best for their examinations!




