

Principal's Message

Dear Families,

Welcome back to Term Two. What a fabulous Vacation Programme the children have enjoyed over the past three weeks. Undoubtedly the highlight was our Royal Slumber Party, where the children and teachers were invited to come to school in their pyjamas, the children thought this was very funny and had a wonderful day, although I think the excitement meant that there was more party than slumber that day!

In this week's newsletter you will find the highlights of our "Once Upon a Time " Vacation theme, it was lovely for the children to explore their favourite fairy tales and have an opportunity to dress up as their favourite book characters. Fairy tales offer children a lot more than just a happily ever after ending. These stories often contain important lessons that children can apply to their everyday lives. From the "Ugly Duckling" we learn that we must not judge others based on appearance and that bullying is a bad choice, whilst from "Little Red Riding Hood" and "Pinocchio" we are cautioned on the danger of talking to strangers. By connecting stories to real life issues children build resilience, empathy and understanding. Of course when sharing fairy tales it is important that we do not dwell on the scarier aspects of wolves or dragons, but instead use these as opportunities to help children start to distinguish between fantasy and reality.

According to Child Psychologist Sally Goddard Blyth fairy tales are important for helping children to understand complex and confronting feelings that they cannot yet articulate themselves. Our children are already learning about making good and bad choices and seeing the hero or heroine prevail over bad can be helpful in encouraging children to feel safe. Fairy tales can offer a safe place for children to explore anxieties that they often do not speak about and as fairy tales end of a positive note, this can be reassuring and ease anxieties, particularly at a time when children's imaginations are running wild.

Fairy tales also offer wonderful opportunities to build early literacy skills as they teach the basics of a story structure such as setting, plot and characters. They learn that a story has a beginning, middle and an end and encourages children to make predictions and read for meaning.

Our Stage 4 children enjoyed their introduction to fairy tales so much they have decided to explore a range of stories during their Provocation this term. They may even follow Han's Christian Anderson's advice and construct their own stories, as he reminds us "everything you look at can become a fairy tale and you can get a story from everything you touch." Nothing is more powerful than the imagination.

Day 4: Fairy Tale Charades

We embarked on an exciting adventure today as we discovered the story of "Hansel and Gretel" and "Little Red Riding Hood."

Developing our fine motor skills, we used coloured textas to trace a path on a map to help Hansel and Gretel find their way home. On our journey, we also dotted our textas along the path to represent breadcrumbs, so the two brave children could navigate their way through the woods.

In the Atelier, the children were treated to coloured paint and textas and encouraged to create their own "Hansel, Gretel" and "Little Red Riding Hood." We used paint brushes and our fingers to move the paint effortlessly across the page as we swirled, jotted and glided around the paper. As our budding artists put their imaginations to use, we conversed about the stories and what we recalled about the different characters. Although "Little Red Riding Hood" had a red cape in the story, the children suggested the cape could be blue, pink, yellow or rainbow instead! We discussed the wolf's big teeth in "Little Red Riding Hood" and what food she had in her basket. We collectively agreed that she would most definitely have lollies in her basket as a treat only, of course!

We then moved on to a sensory experience, manipulating coloured pasta, rice and sand with our index fingers to create a path for "Little Red Riding Hood" to get to Grandma's house. Some of the children used the pasta as props, pointing to various pieces and saying "Wolf! Raaaah!" and "Grandma's house".

Finally, the children were invited to role play their very own "Hansel and Gretel" adventure, using 3D shapes of various characters and scenes from the story. The children squealed with delight as some of our teachers created voices for each character!

It has been a fun-filled adventure today in the land of fairy tales.
